"Remember me when you come into your kingdom," the guilty one said to the Guiltless.

"What kingdom are you going to?" I wondered.

He looked at me and said, "The one that I created."

I gasped in disbelief at His bloodied mass. "You a king? How? I've only seen you in pauper's rags!"

"I chose the rags...for you."

"I don't understand...'

"Draw close. What name is written on this cross." I recoiled in horror as I saw not His name but my own written there. Had some incredible mistake been made? Were they looking for me? A surge of fear swept through me, leaving me limp. "Don't be afraid, I have taken your place," said He.

"But I can't!"

"That is why you must let me go. For I will rise again."

Scriptural focus on events in Christ's life on the corresponding day leading to Passover will be observed in the chapel daily from 12 to 1 p.m. Scriptural reflections will occur in the first half hour followed by personal meditation and communion. Those who attend are free to leave at any time following the scriptural focus.

Communion will be available for personal observance in the chapel with the exception of the noon day devotional hour.

We invite you to come to the Chapel Observances for the day or as you can and to use the Prayer Garden for your personal time of meditation and reflection.

A Scriptural narrative of events and times of this Passover Day will be provided as an aid for personal reflection and meditation.

Observance is essentially individual and personal, with intermittent times of guided focus.

Personal communion – the Lord's supper – is encouraged throughout the day on an individual basis.

This form of prayer is an instrument for experiencing the presence of God in profound ways. It moves the follower of Christ into an intimacy with Him that infuses one with peace and an overwhelming sense of love and worship. It is this praying that allows one to better know God and recognize His voice. This kind of prayer is the basis for all other effective praying

WHEN GOD SHOWS UP

At the brink of suicide, my brother called me. I had never heard him so depressed. His gun was on the table, ready for use. My thoughts reverted back to years ago when our uncle committed suicide the same way, and I was afraid.

I kept praying for him, attempting to share the hope of Christ with him.

I enlisted the prayer team to pray as well. They prayed for the Lord's intervention to preserve him and to provide those who could help him and to use this to draw my brother into a relationship with the Lord.

Normally a happy man, the "life of the party," my brother was hardly recognizable to me at this point. He had also fallen back into alcoholism. Within a few days, thankfully, he was in a safe place, a treatment center. But the care there was not as he had hoped. He returned in a month, slightly improved on an antidepressant, but still commenting he felt as bad as when he left for the treatment center, particularly because of painful

deteriorating relationships with his daughters. The prayer team continued to pray, adding prayers for his relationship with his daughters.

The Lord used means I'd never expected. Upon his return, my brother stayed for several days with a cousin, a recovered alcoholic, who encouraged him to pray. (I didn't even think our cousin was a Christian.) The rest was God's miraculous work. Over the next few weeks I heard statements from my brother like, "I don't know how or what God's doing, but it's just one miracle after another." "My faith is like a personal relationship now, instead of religion." "I feel His Presence and power." "I get up every day and ask God what He wants me to do and then do it." As I heard joy in his voice, he told of restored relationships with his daughters.

Only God could have done all this. I'm amazed at the ways in which our prayers have been answered.

Grateful
