Dearhearts,

My mother lived a triumphant life...though she only knows that now. Hers was an arduous trek, and weariness draped about her like an unwelcome garment. But she was triumphant in her love. In her endurance. She never stopped trying...never stopped pressing... never gave up. She lived until the day she died. And she put that hour in God's hands. She never wrote anything significant...except her letters to us. She never got her Bachelor's degree, though she had enough hours for almost two degrees. She never had any of the credentials that certify success. But mother lived in triumph.

In January before she died in May of that year, she began telling me she didn't think she would be here much longer. In one of those times we began talking about her life. I told her what an amazing life she had lived. Almost as though she hadn't heard, she said, "It's been a hard life." Like cold water in my face, her words brought me back to her reality...not mine. Her reality was the struggle... mine was her prevailing triumph over the struggle.

Perhaps that was the way it was with Lincoln...or Churchill. They both were shrouded with depression, which always pushed Churchill back from the edge of the train platform for fear of what he might do if he stood too close. Yet we see their grandeur. Their prevailing lives...their triumph.

I don't know when it was that Mother completely vielded her life over God. But the last decade of her life, whether at her home or mine, she would be sitting in the chair around 5:00 in the morning reading her Bible and praying.

And in her weakness...His power was made whole. Perhaps this is what II Corinthians 12:7-10 means. The times when I have felt most disabled seemed neither noble nor triumphant. I felt weak...defeated. Maybe it is that His power made perfect in our weakness may be something only others can see ... or we can see only in hindsight as redemption transforms the shambles.

What we see and what is...are often two different things. In Peter's bitter, weeping night, a rock was

forming. In the darkness of Golgotha, morning was breaking upon earth. In the tomb, a womb was forming to birth a life never before seen upon earth. And on the Emmaus road, grieving disciples walked with a stranger they only later would know was Jesus.

What makes up the difference between a struggling life and a triumphant life is not events or outcome...it is God. We see our failures...our weaknesses...yet these are just the vacuum God is waiting for to rush in and make whole and perfect what is so inadequate.

So what do you see of your life? Is it the deficiencies? Is it what should have been or could have been? Do you see nothing to vouch for your success? No credentials that certify your significance? Or is it a sloppy mix of success and failure? Or perhaps you see a massively successful life? It is likely your life is none of these. But something you cannot see. What you may see as failure others may see as triumphant.

For each of us there is a time to offer our lives to God for Him to do with as He will. These times usually come amid the debris of our inadequacies. In some of my most disillusioning, defeating times when I saw myself as a mess, a picture of the clay from which we have come would be in my mind, and I would cry to the Lord, "Take this wad of clay and throw it!" Throw it where you will. Let it splat on the wall and be broken. Throw it on the potter's wheel to be re-fashioned into something I cannot see. I am nothing. And if anything is to be made of me...it can only be by your doing.

Only here, where self yields to the Divine, can the miracle of II Corinthians 12 be fulfilled in us. Perhaps it is that in such places, given over to Him, His strength is made perfect in our weakness...and we do not even

It may be something only others can see.

I love you.

Sequestration Cuts Hit Pine Ridge

It's easy for us to say, "go ahead and let the sequestration cuts happen," but that's because we are relatively unaffected by them. There is a need for us to look beyond ourselves at what it really means for others who are not as fortunate as we.

Recently, the assistant principal of the 600 student school in the Pine Ridge community told us that a million dollars was being cut from their school budget. This is just for one school on the reservation! Remember, as part of the Department of Interior, they are solely dependant on federal funding and have no way to re-coup this staggering loss through public donations or their own resources. And why are we surprised there are third-world conditions on Pine Ridge?

Local veterinarian, *Dr. David Celella*, heads a 3-man team of *Jack Bostick* and *Sandy Haran* that leaves for Pine Ridge Wednesday morning October 2. Dr. Celella specializes in care of horses and he and his team will be vaccinating and rendering general care to horses on the reservation. There is a possibility, as well, that he will be conducting a workshop on general medical care for horses.

Partnership for Housing is coordinating the effort there and has lined up at least 50 horses for their medical attention. Vaccinations for this many horses is quite expensive, but Dr. Celella has received some assistance from the company that supplies the vaccines. Dayspring is using some of the donations you have so generously given to help deflect some of the expenses for the trip as well.

Dr. Celella initiated contact with us only a short time ago, inquiring of the possibility of going to Pine Ridge the first of October. We were thrilled at his interest, made some enquiries, and very quickly found things coming together.

Our prayers are with this team of men as they take their skill and compassion to the reservation. May the Lakota people they come in contact with see in them the Christ who loves them more than they can know.

A Letter from CASA

We wish we could show you the three large photos Casa director Arlana Bettelyoun sent us of the newly furnished safe room for debriefing the children who come because of abuse. The table, lamps, sofa and chair and a small bed have all been purchased with the \$500 we sent for that purpose from your donations. That they were able to create such a warm and inviting room with such a small fund is both impressive and gratifying.

We continue to help with the self-sufficiency workshops sponsored by Partnership for Housing and with gas cards to help with travel expense for CASA volunteers.

Nursing Home Ministry Retires

After three years of a vibrant ministry outreach, we are suspending our nursing home ministry. For much of this time it has been a very dynamic aspect of our overall ministry with several ladies visiting weekly (and sometimes several times a week). Elaine Souder held weekly art classes that were eagerly anticipated by many of the residents with Anne Morton assisting her in recent months.

Elizabeth Moses, who spearheaded the visiting and personal ministry to the residents, has recently re-located to Austin, while personnel changes at the nursing home have made it more difficult to effectively hold the art classes. Others who had been actively involved with visiting have experienced changes in their lives that have made it increasingly difficult to continue.

So, at least for now, we are closing this aspect of Dayspring's ministry.

We all miss Elizabeth very much at Dayspring and look forward to the times when she is back either to visit or to reestablish her residency here.

If you've traveled across the Ray Hubbard bridge on 66 going toward 190, you see the dramatic results of the continued drought in our area. What was once lake is now grass. Though we have had more rain in recent months than we have been used to in the last 3 years, it may have deceived us into thinking things were moving in the right direction. Lake Ray Hubbard at the second, western-most bridge, tells us otherwise.

And so does the prayer garden.

Trees have died and plants are dying. Half the plants around the perimeter of Amy's Garden have died or are dying...the wisteria, the star jasmine and 2 or 3 rose of Sharon trees. And now two large bushes in the Garden of Gratitude are gone.

Much, if not all, of this is because the three women (Gay Bostick, Teresa Jacks and Caroline Doyle) who have faithfully tended the garden and hand watered (where needed) for years, cannot keep up with the increasing demands brought on by the drought.

If we had two more people who would be willing to take even an hour out of their week to hand water in targeted areas, we might be able to save some of the plants that are turning brown.

The prayer garden, too, shows us how vital single individuals are to the Lord's work.
